





Martynas Levickis calls his instrument a magic box. But what would a magic box be without an accomplished magician? The native Lithuanian has an unerring sense for the unexpected and surprising, which leaves one amazed and sometimes speechless. His technical ability is beyond criticism. But anyway, what surprises even more is the openness he displays when it comes to exploring new musical paths with the accordion. "I want to redefine the image of my instrument," Levickis says. With his wide-ranging repertoire, which easily integrates baroque or film music, he has long been on the verge of achieving his goal.
